Time passed. I had forgotten all about being nominated. I went away with my wife, to spend some time with my Dad on holiday in Victoria.

About the end of August, my son and daughter were notified by mail that I was one of many nominees for the award. On that big night in September, at the 10th Anniversary Award Presentation, it would have been amazing if I had been there along with all the other students who had been nominated. I am sure they would have been very proud of themselves, but all students who work very hard are winners in my eyes.

On that night, my name was called as the Outstanding Learner for 2005. In my absence the award was accepted by Read Write Now Coordinator Carisa Campbell, from the Minister of Education and Training, the Honourable. Ljiljanna Ravlich, MLC.

One week later, my wife and two children, together with my tutor, had organised their own presentation for me, but the biggest surprise came when Carisa came to present me with my award. She offered lots of kind words of encouragement and was just great.
